AN ACT TO: Prevent non-service animals or emotional support animals from going in public facilities that prohibit pets.

The People of the State of New York, represented in the Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

PURPOSE: We have introduced this bill to differentiate trained Service Animals and "Emotional Support Animals," from people who bring their animals into public facilities that prohibit pets.

SUMMARY OF PROVISIONS:

Section 1: Definitions

Service Animal: A service animal is any animal that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability, including a physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability.

Emotional Support Animal: An emotional support animal (ESA) is a companion animal that a medical professional or licensed counselor has determined provides benefit for an individual with a disability; however, these may or may not be trained, and there is no current regulation of this term.

Public Facility: A public facility is a building in which government operations or activities are held, and other facilities such as restaurants, stores, parks, and buildings, in which the public may be free to come and go.

Insignia: A badge or distinguishing mark of military rank, office, or membership of an organization; an official emblem, usually engraved on a person's driver license.

Section 2:

(1) All Emotional Support Animals and Service Animals in New York State must possess a valid Service Animal/ Emotional Support Animal License or Insignia, to be held by their owner to justify entering any public facility that prohibits animals.

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(2) Service Animal or Emotional Support Animal owners who wish to bring their animal into a public place that normally prohibits animals, must show proof of the animal's validity by license or insignia.

JUSTIFICATION: In New York State today, we have an extreme problem of people abusing the right to bring a service animal or emotional support animal into a public facility. People who wish to bring their pets onto public property often abuse this right. People can abuse this right by simply lying when asked about their animal, as the manager can only ask a person with a service animal two questions; Is the animal a service animal required because of a disability? And, what work or task has the animal been trained to perform? Due to the leisure of the bill, many people can cheat the system by saying "Yes" and "He/She is trained for my mental disability". Just like that, even if the animal is not a service animal, and the owner of the animal clearly does not have a disability, there are few actions that manager or the facility can take. The clear flaw in the system can be solved by a simple license on a small card, or an insignia that states the validity of the service animal. This insignia can be easily engraved into a person's driver license, to justify their animal, or a license placed on a small card indicating the animals name, purpose, and owners name. This simple and easy solution can eliminate the problem of people entering public facilities with their animal, who do not have a disability.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS: This bill would have little economic effect. It would only cost a small fee to engrave an insignia on a person's ID, or to have a license mailed to you. This license will not add any cost to registering the animal, as it will be mandatory if you wish to be in public with you service/emotional support animal. This license will be easily accessible by all people who already have a service animal.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This bill shall go into effect immediately by distributing licenses and engraving insignia's, but will not be enforced until January 1, 2018.
