An Act To Amend New York Agriculture and Markets Law Section 353-d to grant
civil immunity to private individuals when removing a vulnerable animal from a
vehicle.

The People of the State of New York, represented in the Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

9 Purpose

- 10 This amendment to the New York Agriculture and Markets Law Section 353-d will
- 11 add a provision granting civil immunity to private individuals for entering a motor
- 12 vehicle by force or otherwise for the purpose of removing an unattended vulnerable
- 13 animal provided certain conditions are met.
- 14

15 Summary of Provisions

- 16 <u>Section 1 Definitions:</u>
- Private individual- shall mean any individual who is not acting as a police officer,
 peace officer, or agent of a duly incorporated humane society.
- <u>Unattended vulnerable animal</u>- shall mean any companion animal left in a vehicle
- 20 where the owner or operator of the vehicle can not be readily located
- 21 <u>Section 2:</u>
- Amends New York Agriculture and Markets Law Section 353-d, to paragraph 8 asfollows:
- 24 § 353-d. Confinement of companion animals in vehicles: extreme temperatures.
- 25 <u>8. A private individual who forcibly enters a motor vehicle for the purpose of</u>
- removing an unattended vulnerable animal shall not be subject to civil liability for
 damages arising from the forcible entry if the person:
- 28 <u>A. determines that the motor vehicle is locked or that there is no reasonable means</u>
- 29 for the animal to extracted from the vehicle;
- B. reasonably and in good faith believes that forcible entry into the motor vehicle is
 necessary because the animal is in imminent danger;
- 32 <u>C. notifies local law enforcement, fire department or a 911 operator prior to forcibly</u> 33 <u>entering the vehicle;</u>
- 34 D. remains with the unattended vulnerable animal in a safe location reasonably
- 35 close to the motor vehicle until the police or other emergency responder arrives;
- 36 E. places a notice on the vehicle that law enforcement, the authorities, or a 911
- 37 operator has been notified and specifying the location of the animal and private
- 38 individual attending to the animal; and
- 39 <u>F. uses no more force to enter the vehicle to remove the animal than necessary</u>
- 40 <u>under the circumstances.</u>

1 Justification

2 Keeping animals in a locked car in extreme temperatures can injure and even kill 3 whatever is trapped in the car. Dogs, for example, are only able to cool themselves 4 by panting and by sweating through their paw pads. Outside temperature increases 5 the internal temperature of a car rapidly. On a 78-degree day, a car can get up to 6 100 degrees in minutes. On a 90-degree day, the car can get up to 109 degrees in 7 10 minutes. Animals can die or sustain major brain damage in this amount of time. 8 Thousands of animals die in extreme conditions per year. An independent study 9 showed that the interior temperature of vehicles parked in outside temperatures 10 ranging from 72 to 96° F rose steadily as time increased. Another study, performed by the Louisiana Office of Public Health, found that the temperatures in a dark 11 12 sedan as well as a light gray minivan parked on a hot, but partly cloudy day, 13 exceeded 125° F within 20 minutes. This reveals that it takes a very short period of 14 time for a car to heat up above a dog's point of withstanding. Another fact is proven 15 by the "Department of GeoSciences," after just 30 minutes of a car sitting in a 70 16 degree (F) day, a car's temperature rose to 108 degrees, a temperature much too 17 hot for a dog or other animal to withstand, especially dogs with a big fur coat. 18 Although dogs are not the only ones placed in these situations, they are most 19 common. 20 By providing protections for individuals that rescue vulnerable, unattended animals 21 being trapped in the vehicles with extreme internal temperatures, there is a greater

- 22 likelihood that the animals will survive. Good Samaritan laws are meant to protect
- those who come to the aid of medical emergency victims for no other reason than
- kindness. The passing of this law may increase the incentive of those are looking to
- 25 help because they know they will not troubled by the law.

31 The law will go into effect 3 months after being passed.
