- 1 **Sponsors:** Olivia Lombardo and Caitlin Fitzgerald
- 2 An Act To Amend § 804 Title 1 of Article 17 of the Education Law to improve and
- 3 expand the sexual health education curricula in all public schools in New York State by
- 4 mandating the teaching of consent and creating a task force to oversee its 5 implementation

6 The People of the State of New York, represented in the Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

- 7 **Purpose** This bill will mandate the creation of a task force responsible for establishing
- 8 and implementing a comprehensive, medically-accurate, and age- appropriate sexual
- 9 health education curricula in all schools for students in grades 1-12.

## 10 **Summary of Provisions**

- 11 Section 1: Definitions
- 12 Consent: Affirmative consent is a knowing, voluntary, and mutual decision among all
- participants to engage in sexual activity. Consent can be given by words or actions, as
- 14 long as those words or actions create clear permission regarding willingness to engage
- in the sexual activity. Silence or lack of resistance, in and of itself, does not
- 16 demonstrate consent. The definition of consent does not vary based upon a
- 17 participant's sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression. Age-
- 18 appropriate: topics, messages and teaching methods suitable to particular ages or age
- 19 groups of students, based on developing cognitive, emotional, and behavioral capacity
- 20 typical for the age or age group.
- 21 Medically-accurate verified or supported by the weight of research conducted in
- 22 compliance with accepted scientific methods and published in peer-reviewed journals,
- 23 where applicable, or comprising information that leading professional organizations
- 24 and agencies with relevant expertise in the field recognize as accurate, objective, and
- 25 complete.
- 26 School a school under the jurisdiction of New York State Law.
- 27 Student any student enrolled in a school under the jurisdiction of New York State
- 28 Law that has yet to receive a high school diploma.
- 29 Program/curricula the curricula that the task force established in this bill will create
- 30 and implement.
- 31 Section 2: Provisions
- 32 2. DELETE § 804-a. Section 2. Replace with:
- 33 Any schooling institution shall be required to implement the comprehensive,
- 34 medically-accurate, and age-appropriate health education curricula to all students in
- 35 grades 1-12 on a yearly basis.
- 36 2. Parents/legal guardians of students in schools can opt out of the program.
- 37 Section 3: Curricula
- 38 § 804-a.3. A comprehensive, medically-accurate, and age-appropriate health
- 39 education curricula will be established by a task force of individuals and be given the



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40 authority to update and alter it as seen fit. At least twenty members will be appointed

- 41 in conjunction with the sitting New York State Senators (at the time this bill is put into
- 42 effect) and contain at least 20 individuals: minimum of six shall be experts in sexual
- 43 health education, five New York State public school teachers, four staff persons from
- 44 New York State public schools who are not teachers (such as a guidance counselor or
- 45 social worker), three experts in the field of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender,
- 46 questioning and gender non-conforming health education, and two representatives
- 47 from the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene.
- 48 2. After appointment, members of the task force established in this bill will be given
- 49 authority over the curricula that shall be established in all New York State public
- schools. Nonetheless, these individuals will be given guidelines that must be followed:
- 1) curricula must include and expand upon the recommendations for sexual health
- 52 education as provided by the New York State Education Department, 2) curricula must
- be age-appropriate, medically accurate, and medically affirming, 3) curricula must
- 54 cover sexual abuse prevention, healthy relationships and consent, and non-
- 55 heterosexual relationships, and 4) members of the task force are responsible for
- oversight insofar as 4a) improving and expanding implementation and staff training
- and 4b) ensuring that sexual health education is fully inclusive of lesbian, gay,
- 58 bisexual, transgender, gender nonconforming, questioning (LGBTQ) students, and the
- 59 diverse needs of students.
- 60 **Justification** It is a simple fact that teens are engaging in sexual intercourse 70%
- of teenagers in New York State reported to have had sex by the time they were 19.
- 62 However, with the prevalence of sex among youth in New York State without the
- 63 proper sexual health education, 35% reported to have never learned consent in the
- classroom the dangers of intercourse are ever-present. By the time a woman enters
- college, one in five of her female peers will be a victim of sexual assault or rape.
- 66 Learning consent throughout one's life ensures that sexual assault currently at an all
- 67 time high can be reduced; New York State has the eleventh-highest teenage
- pregnancy rate in the nation, with almost 60 pregnancies per 1,000 girls aged 15-to-
- 69 19 each year. Despite reports released by the CDC and Planned Parenthood, little has
- been changed; but, one thing remains certain: a lifelong approach to sexual education
- 71 is a sure solution to decreasing disease and unwanted pregnancies caused by sex.
- 72 **Fiscal Implications** There will be an estimated \$500,000 allocated to appropriate
- 73 startup measures and \$250,000 annually for other necessary steps to
- 74 maintain/change the curriculum and/or members in the task force. These costs are
- 75 modeled after the New York Education Department and New York Department of
- Health. This funding will be calculated in accordance with § 804-a.1.
- 77 **Effective Date** This bill shall go into effect two years after passage
