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Committee Assignment: Assembly Liberty 2 Bill #:AL-14

**An Act To:** Amend §1028B of the Sexual Health Education law so that its a full New York State bill establishing a statewide sexual health education task force to mandate comprehensive, medically accurate, culturally, and age appropriate sex education to be taught in all public schools in grades six through twelve.

### The People of the State of New York, represented in the Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

### <u>Purpose</u>

Mandates that comprehensive, medically accurate, culturally, and age appropriate sex education be taught in all public schools in grades six through twelve.

#### **Summary of Provisions:**

#### Section 1: Definitions

Medically accurate; verified or supported by research conducted in compliance with accepted scientific methods and recognized as accurate and objective by professional organizations and agencies with expertise in the relevant field, such as the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Age appropriate; suitable for a particular age or age group.

#### Section 2:

A bill establishing a citywide statewide sexual health education task force – into law, making his the first Administration to launch a comprehensive review of the current state of sexual health education in New York City State. The bill is promoting the spread of sex education in classrooms throughout New York. With more people learning about proper health information, fewer people will have to struggle with the unknowingness of safe sex. The most efficient way for a longer solution leading to knowledge on sex education is through learning it in school, with real-world examples and statistics, instead of just touching on the subject or only teaching abstinence which has been shown to be ineffective. "There's a lot of social and emotional learning embedded throughout," said Stephanie Gregson, director of the Curriculum Frameworks and Instructional Resources Division at the California Department of Education."Not learning about sex education from an early age is just going to hurt more people. Children will have sex so instead of not adressing it at all or just telling them to practice abstinence they need to be informed on how to do so safely.



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61 62 Justification: "The United States ranks first among developed nations in rates of both teenage pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases" according to Kathrin F. Stanger-Hall and David W. Hall. Sex education laws would overall decrease the number of unexpected pregnancy rates and STd's in the United States for those in all classes of economy but especially those in poverty. The Guttmacher Institute states, "In 2011, the unintended pregnancy rate among women with incomes lower than the federal poverty level, at 112 per 1,000." The National Conference of State Legislators explains, "In 2011, approximately 24 percent of new HIV diagnoses were young people age 13 to 24." This shows that teens not being educated of sexual diseases causes them to be exposed to them and not knowing how to properly protect and prepare themselves which could have been prevented. There is a real way to prevent pregnancies for those who had them from unintended sex. The US Library of Medicine elaborates on this important issue. "Fully 95% of unintended pregnancies are attributable to the one-third of women who do not use contraceptives." If schools teach students to use contraceptives and show them negative outcomes, they will learn to use it, and reduce the amount of complications. Another important attribute to sex education is what is being taught. "The level of abstinence education (no provision, covered, promoted, stressed) was positively correlated with both teen pregnancy and teen birth rates, indicating that abstinence education in the U.S. does not cause abstinence behavior. To the contrary, teens in states that prescribe more abstinence education are actually more likely to become pregnant." according to Abstinence-Only Education and Teen Pregnancy Rates: Why We Need Comprehensive Sex Education in the U.S. Many states only teach abstinence which is actually making matters worse which is part of the reason it is so important for better education on the subject.

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**<u>Fiscal Implications:</u>** In FY 2016 Congress provided \$176 million in federal funding for sex education programs. New York would be using the funding in these programs.
