An Act To:

- 4 Amend Article 1 Section 45 of New York State Tax Law to give tax exemption for 5 6 those who adopt children and who have adopted children.
 - The People of the State of New York, represented in the Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

- 8 To encourage adoption and fostering in New York State by adding benefits to those
- 9 who adopt or foster children and those who have adopted children.

Summary of Provisions 10

- 11 Section 1: Definitions
- 12 Except: To limit or eliminate an obligation from someone, in this case, taxes
- 13 Income Tax: A tax taken directly from someone's pay from a job
- 14 Section 2
- Those who adopt or foster a child or have already adopted or fostered a child in 15
- New York State will have the following tax benefits until the child has reached the 16
- 17 age of 18:
- 18 1. The amount of money taken for income tax will be reduced by 25% of the
- 19 current amount
- 20 2. This tax exemption does not increase with the amount of children you adopt or
- 21 foster

Justification

- 23 Our bill will create an incentive for more children to be adopted and fostered in the
- state of New York. Adoption is a lengthy and expensive process that make it a last 24
- 25 resort. This bill will make the process of raising many kids without a home into
- functioning members of society. In addition, many children within the foster care 26
- 27 system spend a lot of time in the system before being adopted permanently, with
- 28 an average time spent in the system being 4.3 years before being adopted in the
- 29 state of New York. That is 4 years of their childhood lost to the system. Most kids
- 30 after the age of nine spent their life in foster care and do not get adopted. At the
- 31 age of eighteen they are put onto the streets with no family. Is this what we want
- for people with such potential for good? 32

35 **Fiscal Implications**

- Taking the amount of children adopted in New York State and taking into account 36
- the variations in income tax, it is predicted that this bill will lead to a 2 to 5 million 37
- 38 dollar decrease in income tax revenue

40 This bill will go into effect as of January 1st of the year following this bill's passage.
