2 An Act To

- 3 Amend § 240.50 of the New York State penal law to raise the penalty for false child
- 4 abuse accusations from a class A misdemeanor to a class E felony.
- 5 The People of the State of New York, represented in the Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

6 <u>Purpose</u>

- 7 Our bill is to increase the penalty on false accusations of child abuse from a class a
- 8 misdemeanor to a class E felony.

9 Summary of Provisions

- 10 <u>Section 1: Definitions</u>
- 11 Child abuse: An act, or failure to act. On the part of parent or caretaker that results
- 12 in death, serious pain or serious emotion harm, sexual abuse, or exploitation of a
- 13 child, or which places the child in imminent risk or serious harm.
- 14 Class A Misdemeanor: Upon conviction of a class A misdemeanor, a court may
- 15 <u>sentence an individual to a maximum of one year in jail or three years of probation.</u>
- 16 In addition, a fine of up to \$1000 or twice the amount of the individual's gain from
- 17 <u>the crime may be imposed.</u>
- 18 Class E felony: Are the least serious and carry penalties of up to three years in
- 19 <u>prison.</u>
- 20 <u>Section 2:</u>
- 21 § 240.50 falsely reporting an incident in the third degree. A person is guilty of
- 22 falsely reporting an incident in the third degree when, knowing the information
- 23 reported, conveyed or circulated to be false or baseless, he:
- 24 4. Reports, by word or action, to the statewide central register of child abuse and
- 25 maltreatment, as defined in title six of article six of the social services law, an
- 26 alleged occurrence or condition of child abuse or maltreatment which did not in fact
- 27 occur or exist. The penalty for this crime will be a class E felony, which carries a
- 28 punishment of up to three years in prison.

29 Justification

- 30 False accusations of child abuse are serious crimes. In 2018, out of 166,000 cases
- of child abuse, 118,846 were proven false. When a person is
- 32 convicted of child abuse their name will be added to a database of people
- 33 who mistreated children, and by law their name will have to stay for many
- 34 years. Even when allegations are unfounded, names will stay on the registry
- 35 until the youngest child in the case turns twenty-eight or five to seven years after
- 36 the case is dismissed.
- 37 **Fiscal Implications** The cause of housing one inmate in NYS is \$60,000.
- 38 **Environmental Implications** There are no known environmental implications.
- 39 **<u>Effective Date</u>** This bill will go into effect one year after passage.
